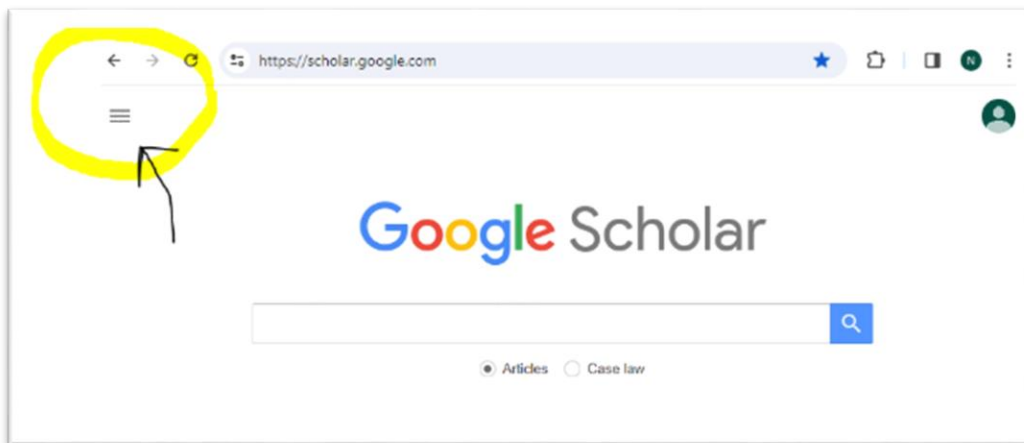


GOOGLE SCHOLAR: LINKING TO NMIT ONLINE RESOURCES

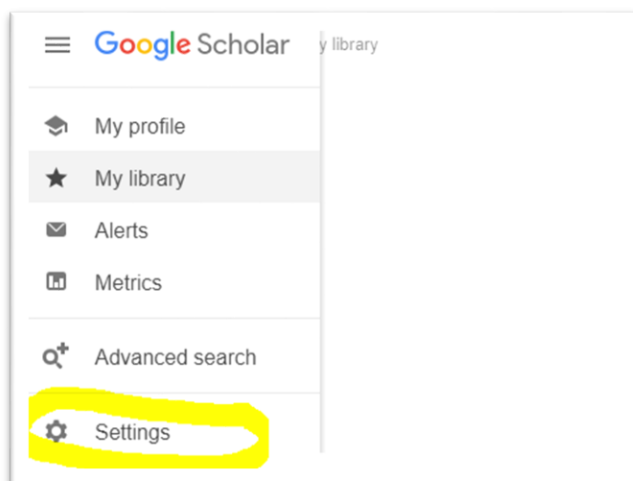
TE PUNA MĀTAURANGA - LIBRARY LEARNING CENTRE

You can set up your Google Scholar to link to full text online resources provided by NMIT.

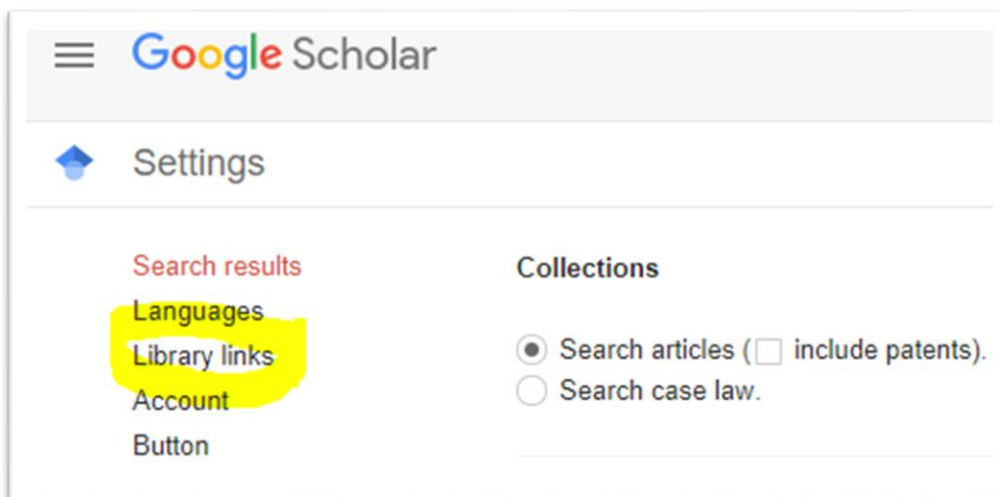
1. Open [Google Scholar \(https://scholar.google.com\)](https://scholar.google.com) and click on the pancake menu at top left.



2. From the drop-down menu, select **Settings**.



3. From the **Settings** options, click on the **Library links** tab.

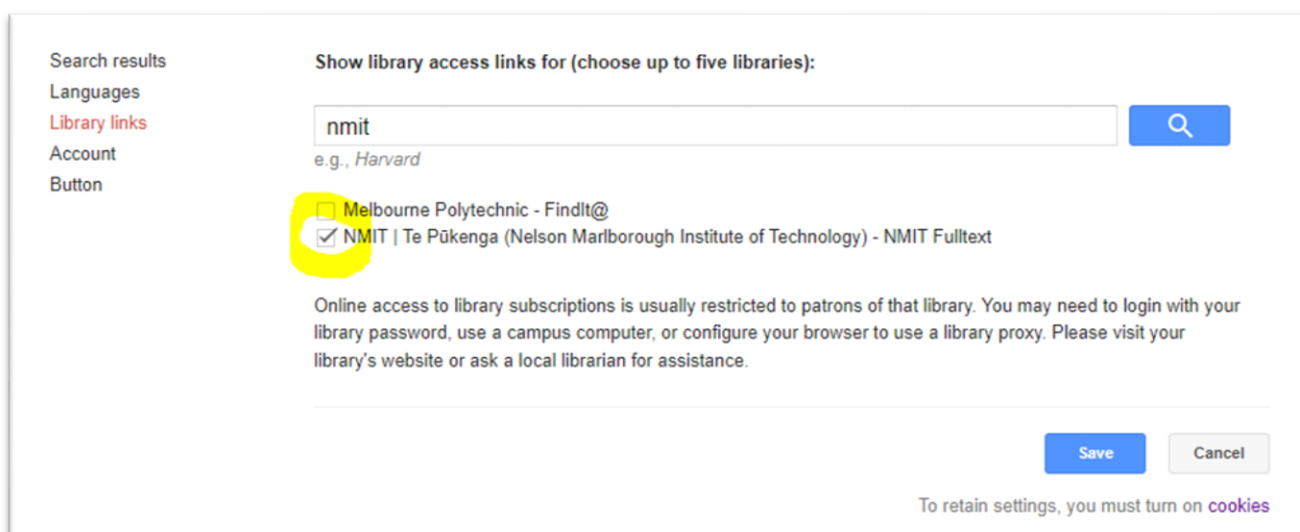


4. In the search box under **Show library access links for (choose up to five libraries)**, type **nmit** and then press Enter or click on the magnifying glass to search.

6. Now when you search Google Scholar, you will see a clickable '**NMIT Fulltext**' link next to articles in your search results when NMIT has full text online access.
